

## The History and Mystery of Oregon's Hosmer Lake "Then and Now"



tep back in "time" to 1963. Kenya was achieving independence, The Beatles were on their way to immortality, The World's Fair was in Seattle, WA and Oregon's Hosmer Lake was beginning its emergence as a North American fly fishing destination.

Reading a brief article in the Springfield (OR) News that called attention to landlocked Atlantic Salmon hitting flies, Michael T Williams made his first visit to Hosmer, then officially named, Mud Lake, in June of 1963.

Atlantic salmon from Gaspe' Bay, Quebec's wild, searun stock, reared at Wizard Falls Hatchery on the Metolius River, were now patrolling Hosmer's shallow waters. Hosmer had been built and fly fishers were coming, and returning, loving the sights of leaping fish and screaming fly reels. Hosmer Lake was being discovered.

Imagine this, upon William's first Hosmer visit, he was 19, owned one fly rod and one Herter's fly tying vise. Imagine this, sight dry fly fishing to jumping, reel screaming Atlantics! Imagine this, until 1965, when Mud Lake officially became Hosmer Lake,

crowds were unknown and 40 fish days were common! Fast forward to 2013. With the dramatic decline of Hosmer's salmon health, ODFW chose to stock wild strains of Cutthroat and Rainbow trout instead of salmon.

Sometimes "change" seems difficult to accept. Williams says he doesn't have answers as to why "wild stock sea-run salmon eggs" were discontinued. He believes however, that Hosmer Lake could, once again, be a Mecca for sighting and fighting gorgeous fish. This time, in addition to the hefty Brook trout---Cutthroats that pull and Rainbows that jump!

### High Lakes Gathering July 3-6 Rock Creek Campground at Crane Prairie

he Cascade Lakes Highway takes one to a dozen easy access lakes and reservoirs filled with a variety of fish, including several that are noted for producing BIG bass and trout on a regular basis. Each lake offers a different experience due to size, depth and species variations. Those who are familiar with these lakes will happily share their knowledge while sitting around the campfire.

Of course mosquitoes are ever present, just waiting for the breeze to die so they can feed on us. Fortunately, Rock Creek Campground has never been a problem for me, as there is nearly always enough air movement to keep them away. Speaking of which, the wind on these lakes can be very strong. Again, fortunately, Rock Creek Campground has some protection from the prevailing winds and float tubes, canoes, kayaks and pontoon boats can access a large body of water with partial shelter from the wind. There are also many smaller lakes perfect for small craft.

To get there, drive east on Highway 58 until you are about three miles past Crescent Village, which is the last easy stop for amenities. Turn left onto Highway 61, go about four miles and turn left again onto the Cascade Lakes Highway 46. The campground is about 20 miles north from this point and about three miles past the Highway 42 turnoff to Lapine, turn right into the Rock Creek Campground. The sign is on the left side of the highway. Go in about 200 yards and take the left hand road. This leads to a parking lot for boat trailers, bathrooms, a fish-cleaning station, water and the campground host. In the NE corner of the parking lot is the entrance to F loop which is where our group will meet. Rick will try to get the F-8 group site, and anyone wishing to share the site is welcome.

The area abounds in hiking trails and close-by scenic drives. Don't forget your camera! There are resorts on some of the lakes, and services are not far away in Bend and LaPine.

Bring a variety of flies and nymphs: The wind blows really large carpenter ants into the shore water, chironomids work very well, damsel flies and dragonflies abound, stickleback minnows plague Crane Prairie and other regular aquatic bug life is present.

There are areas along the Deschutes River to fish as well. The lakes often require long leaders. Come for the day or come and stay. This is always a fun trip, fish Crane Prairie or one of the other nearby lakes, you are sure to have good company.

### **Volunteer Opportunity and Volunteers**

Salmon and Trout Enhancement Program (STEP)

High Lakes Stocking July 19th 2014

Healthy, sustainable stocks of salmon and trout is what STEP is all about. If you would like to get involved, come to the High Lakes Stocking on July 19th.

Trips leave from the Leaburg Hatchery near Vida to go primarily to lakes in the 3 Sisters Wilderness and from the Willamette Hatchery in Oakridge for the North Waldo and Diamond Peak Wilderness area. Each participant needs to provide their own backpack, which we line with plastic bags. We add fish, water, ice and oxygen, tape the bag up and send you on your way to stock your designated waterbody. The maximum load that we give anyone is about 35 pounds, but we can easily scale back so that even the smallest participants can carry fish. Each participant is responsible for providing their own sufficient supplies for hiking, which include water, food, appropriate clothing, and a first aid kit.

If you are interested in participating, please let **Shannon Richardson** know how far you're willing to hike (anywhere from .25 mile to 3-4 miles, one way) and whether you have a 4WD/AWD vehicle.




