Diamond Lake Outing Report

The weather report was bad. I had been a bit late in arriving at the lodge due to completing the final stages of finishing the auction activities left from the night before, such as taking the few remaining items that had not been sold to St. Vincent DePauls for donation, assembling my fishing equipment, readying the drift boat for seaworthiness, packing a lunch for the road and gassing the car. At 10:45 I was on the road looking forward to one of my favorite outings. I was looking forward to this outing especially because there were new members of the club that I had not yet fished with and other than meeting them at club meetings I knew nothing about. You never know.

By the time I had arrived at the resort, it was getting dark so I took my gear to my room, grabbed my fly rod and a box of flies and headed for the dock in front of the resort a spot that had been productive in years past. As I left my room, I noticed this tall slim gentleman with a big smile approaching who called out my name. It was Rich Meltebeke a relatively new member of the club. We exchanged pleasantries and he filled me in as to the others that had already arrived: Curtis Erickson, a veteran Diamond Lake fisher; Bob O'Brian another relatively new member who looked familiar but I couldn't come up a name for - and he never would give it to me as he, like Rich, had met me often at earlier CFF meetings and felt I should have remembered his name. The fifth member, Bob Wolfe (chironomid guru) was already on the water. Rich and I walked down to the dock and I decided to use a fly I had attached while on the Coastal Lakes outing and used for bass in Sutton Lake. It was a Gurdle Bug. I cast out and used the same strip rhythm I had used for bass but without the same positive results. As I fished I had a constant refrain from Rich telling me how he was depending on me to show him how to fish the lake, what to use, and where to fish and even how to hold my mouth while fishing. Pressure, pressure, pressure. (All in good humor of course.) I learned later that he had had probably more experience at Diamond Lake than I had. It wasn't long until another of our group arrived on the pier, Tim Hood. Tim seemed to know quite a bit about Diamond as he too had fished the lake before.

With Tim and Rich and myself all accounted for, we were waiting for Bob W, Curtis, and Bob O and by the time we had walked back to our rooms Curtis, and Bob O had arrived and as far as we knew Bob W. still remained on the water. In the Outing Planning materials I had sent, the agenda for Friday the 23rd was to meet in the Lodge restaurant at 6:30 for dinner and plan the next two days activities. We then took care of any remaining unpacking and headed for the lodge to wait for Bob W. around the nice big, warm fireplace.

Dinner at the Lodge was as always excellent but what made it excellent for me was the opportunity to get to know the four relatively new members and reunite with Curtis with whom I had often fished.

Being an old swabby and coastie, the conversation around the table reminded me of being with a group from the Navy or Coast Guard swapping sea stories. All four of the members were veteran fly fishers with much experience and travel to exotic places to fish with really great stories to share. The two attributes I noticed especially were that all were good listeners, and had great senses of humor. We all agreed to meet again for breakfast at 8:00 in the morning decide when, where, and what to use to fish for the day and return to the restaurant again at 6:30 or 7:00 for dinner, lying, and good humor.

As planned at 8:00 am the CFF crew were in the restaurant having oatmeal, eggs, bacon, sausage, toast hash browns and lots of coffee and tea. We all decided to head for the south end boat launch and most of the flies included chironomids provided by Bob W., and woolly buggers in black, brown and, olive with a size 16-14 prince or other small nymph as the dropper. Casting and stripping using a slow troll both work with pontoons, float tubes, and from a drift boat.

The weather had held and the whole group fished right through until nearly dark. All caught fish. Most between 12 and 14" with a few caught by Curtis and Bob W., Rick, and Bob O. pushing 18-20. Marvin, the awesome host, caught the 12 -14 inchers. We all arrived Back at the restaurant at just about dark for another great meal and plan for the fishing on Sunday the 24th. All agreed that the fishing had been great due to the weather holding, but the catching had been slow. Due to the recent success of club members fishing Crane Prairie Bob W. Bob O. and Rich decided that they would like to meet for breakfast at 7:45 and head for Crane and fish there for the day. Curtis, Tim and me felt we would stay at Diamond and fish. I told the three leaving for Crane I would stop by on my way home and see how they had done and fish if it wasn't yet dark. All agreed with the plan.

Sunday morning on the water was beautiful with sun breaks and clouds and warm in mid 60's. As good weather forecasters often do, I dipped my finger in my mouth and stuck it into the air and proclaimed that there would be no rain forthcoming today. I also gave the air my trained sniff test and proclaimed that the air had no rain essence and would not come. 15 minutes later I was sitting in my drift boat in the middle of one of the worst down pours I had ever experienced. So much for deep scientifically based predictions. The upside of the experience was that when the rain began so did the fish start to bite. I love to fish in the rain. I caught nine fish in 30 minutes all on a brown woolly bugger with the small nymph dropper. I then switched to a size 18 "Trout Candy" chironomid tied by Bob W. and caught four more. None of the 13 fish were huge. Sixteen was the largest with the others again in the 12 to 14 inch range. All fought well and seemed to be enjoying the rain as much as I was. At noon I continued my plan and pulled in, trailered the boat and headed for Crane Prairie. The trip took just under two hours and when I arrived those who left early from Diamond Lake were trailering their pontoons and boats and were ready to head for home. They all had taken some nice fish in the 18 to 20 inch range and were very satisfied with their performance. It was a bit late for me to launch and fish as it was nearly dark so I wished each member safe travels home and hit the road myself.

It was a good trip and all went well. There was much camaraderie and laughs, all caught fish, we enjoyed great food, and all arrived home safely. What more could we have asked for?



Third Quarter Club Report to
Oregon Council International Federation of Fly Fishers

The CFF just keeps moving. Our new digs for our meetings and activities is now in the activity center at the Wesley United Methodist Church at the corner of Oakway and Cal Young Streets in Eugene. With the change of venue also came the necessity of changing our regular meeting days. Board meetings are now on the second Thursday of the month from 6:00 to 7:00 PM. General Membership meetings are on the 4th Thursday of the month. Doors open at 6:15 with demonstration fly tying. The meeting starts at 7:00 and continues to 9:00 PM.

The club has had the good fortune of increasing in membership this quarter from 87 to our current membership of 104. November is the month that new Club Officers, Board Members, and Committee Chairs are selected. We are in the process of recruiting for those positions and encourage those interested to let any one in the current leadership know so we will have a full ballot from which to choose. We will be coming into the year with a healthy budget after a very successful club auction in 2014 and look forward to another on October 22 of 2015. This will give the club the funds to plan and schedule a full calendar of events including, outings, classes, club picnic, holiday party, youth activities, programs, conservation projects, monthly club raffles, and public service activities.

One of the reasons for the increase in membership has been the quality of the presentations made at our monthly general membership meetings as well as other group activities which bring the membership together. These have included: Bob Wolfe – “Why Fish Chironomids”. Bob is a master Chironomid fisherman who includes a great Power Point Presentation which includes the life cycle of the Chironomid, how to tie the flies, and how to fish them. Dean Finnerty: “Smallmouth Bass” also has a great audio visual presentation, reading water, tying flies for smallmouth bass, and where to find these feisty critters. Other well attended activities included the annual club picnic held on the shore of the McKenzie River with 71 members attending and “A Night on the River” held at Taylor Landing Boat Launch also on the McKenzie River with many new members attending. These group activities provide the opportunity for beginners and veteran fly fishers to fish together, give & take instruction, share a great lunch and perhaps even catch some fish.

The “Fly Tying” classes offered are scheduled by the level of skill of the participant from beginner to veteran. Many of the expert tiers in the club assist the lead instructor which provides individual attention to those who request assistance. The classes fill fast.

Outings are another big draw and bring in many new participants who usually join. Outings offered during this Third Quarter included: East Lake, Coastal Lakes, Fall River, Alsea River and Diamond Lake. The fund raising auction offers a number of drift trips on local rivers provided by experienced club members and includes both rivers – McKenzie, Willamette, Deschutes, Crooked, Alsea, Siletz, Umpqua and Siuslaw. Still waters include: East, Wickiup, Paulina, Crescent, Odell, Crane Prairie, Davis, Horton Pond, Hills Creek, Cougar, Blue River, Cottage Grove and Dorena reservoirs.

Community Events include: Demonstration Casting and Fly Tying at the annual Sport and Boat Show in Eugene; ORCFFF Fly Tying and Fishing Expo. in Albany, Ore. , The International Federation of Fly Fishers Fair in Bend, Ore.; Rehabilitation of the Delta Pond Complex in Eugene; Demonstration Fly Tying and Casting at the annual McKenzie River Antique Boat Show at Eagle Rock Lodge on the McKenzie River and the McKenzie River Chainsaw Art Competition in Blue River, Or. Regular demonstration fly tying and casting at various fly fishing businesses such as Cabelas, Home Waters, and Caddis Fly are also provided.

The CFF website is now up and running as promised. Be sure and check it out at cascadefamilyflyfishers.com .

The two community (Professional) activities that provided the most exposure for the CFF this Third Quarter were the ORCFFF Fly Tying and Fishing Exposition held in Albany, Or. and the International Fly Fishing Fair in Bend, Or. The Cascade Club provided 36 volunteers for the Albany show who worked on the Bucket Raffle and provided the services of the “Red Apron Brigade” who wore red aprons and walked the floor selling raffle tickets increasing ticket sales many fold. The set up for the Tiers Reception was also the responsibility of the CFF. The same was true for the CFF involvement at the IFFF show in Bend. 22 volunteers provided similar services as were called for in Albany, having the same result of increasing the revenue from the raffle activities for the benefit of the IFFF.

Please enjoy this Third Quarter Report for 2015. We look forward to bringing our plans for 2016 into fruition.

Annual Auction Report

The outstanding success of our auction this year is the result of an Auction Planning Committee that was enthusiastic, dedicated, and willing to take on the responsibility of contacting our membership to solicit their attendance and their willingness to donate high quality auction items. Some of the other items offered at this table were many excellent fly rods, reels, new "IFFF" vest, boxes of flies tied by the professional fly tiers in the club, a pontoon boat, float tube and great art work in the form of Fly Plates framed by our own Hal Comstock, Vic Hadley and Rod Roth with flies tied by Skip Hosfield, Vic Hadley, Mike Marlatt, Rod Roth, Steve Overall as well as many other items. This innovation for 2015 was a great addition to our overall auction operation.

As we all know, if the food is bad, the remaining parts of any event just don't seem to have much pizzazz. Well from all reports it is no wonder this event was a stunning success as the meal was judged as "outstanding". Our caterer was again "Patty's Catering" and they did not disappoint. Excellent food, abundant portions, hot, and served beautifully. Thanks much Patty's Catering crew.
