A TRIBUTE TO A GOOD FRIEND

One of the best outcomes of being a member of a long established club or organization is developing friendships with it's members and valuing the individual skills, talents, personalities and the sense of humor of it's members. That said, there are always those with whom we get closer to than others whether through shared interests in travel, sports, politics, books, jokes, hobbies or careers. Bill Wise was such a person for me as members of the Cascade Family Fly Fishers (CFF).

I believe that when Bill's name comes up the first thing those of us who knew him well would cite as a major characteristic would be his sense of humor. I got to the point where every time I met him my first question was "Well Bill, what have you got for me this time?" I met Bill around 1985 soon after the CFF was formed when he attended one of our monthly meetings. I never heard him speak to a person sarcastically or with a mean spirit. However, once in a while he could get quite exercised when in a discussion about politics. He was a career heavy equipment sales person serving Lane County and throughout the state of Oregon. This career called for spending a lot of time with loggers, lumber company owners, and log truck drivers. This group provided Bill will a wealth of material for his never-ending joke telling routine. Sometimes his jokes were a bit on the saucy side but most were funny, dry and even bordered on being groaners. He also had a keen eye for the ladies. He loved to dance and was fast to relate that the lady he met at one of the senior dances was really sharp, a good conversationalist, and a smooth dancer. He was also an avid pinochle player. Whenever Thelma and I ran into him in a social situation and he had a date with him, he was always courteous and would introduce us to his guest with that little twinkle in his eye.

Fly fishing together was really what bonded us. I happen to have a drift boat and we would usually float the McKenzie, tie into the Willamette at the confluence of the two rivers and fish to Hayes Lane. Other times we would put in at Blue River and take out at Silver Creek Boat Launch. He loved to go on the outings our club would organize. One of the big events was the "Floatilla" organized by Pet Szekely, another senior member of the club. We had seven boats with 19 fishers. Bill was with me and as we passed under the Egge Sand and Gravel haul bridge Bill said that we should pick up a nice summer steelhead by the time we reached the confluence of the two rivers. Bill had special permission to fish the big flat on the McKenzie just above the confluence and we had driven his big Buick down the haul roads, parked and walked to the river to fish quite often. That spot was always good for some nice rainbows and whitefish. On the day of the Floatilla, we had passed through the flat with no luck at all. About 200 yards above the confluence Bill said "Marv I think I am hooked on a branch". I immediately swung the boat toward where I thought the line was caught but every time I got close,

the line moved. Finally Bill said, "...man, that feels like a steelhead" and sure enough out of the water it came. His favorite fly, a green bodied soft hackle had scored again. He was beside himself giggling as he worked the fish in close to boat so I could net it. Well, I have to tell on myself who prides himself as being an outstanding net man. Every time the fish was brought close to the boat and I was ready to slip the net under it, it would take off. I actually missed it three times and finally lifted it into the boat. By that time I expected Bill to be yelling at me to "Net that ...ing fish" but he just kept laughing and working the fish. It was a nice bright six pound hen steelhead. What a trip.

Bill had a number of "honey holes" like the one under the Egge haul bridge where he had gained the trust of the land owners who granted him private access to their land. Probably one of the best compliments Bill ever paid me was when he invited me to fish at his favorite "honey hole on the McKenzie on the run between the Golf Course and Hendricks Park. I ended up fishing there with him until last year when he could no longer navigate the rocks well enough to wade. It was sad for me to see him so disappointed. I just said, well Bill I guess we will just have to use the drift boat. He smiled and seemed pleased.

Another very popular outing our club hosts every year is called "A Night on the River". Steve and Michelle Overall host the event in the stretch of the McKenzie just down stream from Hendricks Bridge. This event is usually a wading show but I figured that taking the drift boat to Hendricks Park, I could take a couple of our members in the boat who I knew were not comfortable wading. I invited Bill and Vic Hadley. Bill agreed even though he was worried about getting in and out of the boat, and Vic was out of town so it was again just Bill and me. We had fished this stretch quite often over the years and knew the drill. Launch, row up stream to the first riffle and begin fishing close to the shore on the right along the Park. By the time we started under the bridge, Bill had hooked, landed and released eight nice planters. He didn't keep any as he "knew" he would catch more. We drifted down to the others from the club wade fishing in front of the Overalls home but never caught another trout. I could see that Bill was getting a bit tired so I suggested that I row back above the bridge and fish a bit more just off the boat ramp. He agreed.

I took some nice pictures of Bill and the others fishing in front of the Overalls and began back to the boat ramp. What I hadn't realized was that I had gotten a little farther down stream than I had anticipated and eventually had to get out of the boat and tow it. Bill just kept smiling and casting. When I had gotten about 50 yards below the bridge, I was tuckered. Thank goodness for Mike Diehl, who had been fishing just below the bridge, saw me struggling and offered a hand towing. I accepted and soon we were above the bridge and able to row the rest of the way to the ramp. By then both Bill and I were done fishing. Little did know that some of the most strenuous work was yet to come.

Bamboo Dividends Skip Hosfield

I recently came across an article that I started in 2007 but never finished. With the added perspective of six more years I thought it worth finishing in case it might be of interest to others. The original material comprises the following three paragraphs. Everything thereafter is newly written.

Two years ago when I enrolled in the bamboo rodmaking workshop at the 2005 FFF Conclave in Livingston I did so out of a longstanding desire to make a bamboo rod for the experience of doing it. I thought I'd take the class and if a good rod came out of it fine, and if I made a mess of it at least I had the experience of doing it. But during that week in Livingston something quite unexpected happened. I was overcome by a very strong desire to return to my roots by fishing only with bamboo. Whether it was the act of splitting and planing a culm of bamboo or meeting and associating with skilled rodmakers, I knew that whether or not I ever made another rod I would end my fly fishing the way I began it - with a bamboo rod.

As soon as I returned from Livingston I dug out my old Edwards Quadrate which I had purchased in 1949 and laid aside in 1965 in favor of the new Fenwick Feralite rods. I even asked my brother to return the old South Bend that I gave him when he started fly fishing. Both rods were still as good as they were over forty years ago when I quit using them. I even contacted the sons of my late friend George to see if they would sell me his two bamboo rods. Within a week a large package was delivered to my house, three rods - a gift, they said, from their father to his lifelong friend.

One of George's rods is a Gene Edwards 8 foot #5 which was purchased the same week and from the same store where I bought my Bill Edwards Quadrate. The Edwards brothers were the sons of Eustis Edwards who learned his trade under Hiram Leonard. I used George's rod several days this summer and all the while I felt connected to my departed friend and all our shared memories. But through that rod I also felt physically connected to the very roots of American fly fishing. I held in my hand the product of three generations of fly rod makers. To all the other pleasures of fly fishing this is an added dividend that you cannot get with graphite.

Many of us who grew up fishing bamboo rods transitioned seamlessly into fiberglass, but never felt entirely comfortable with the newer faster graphite which followed. Those who have never fished with bamboo may take some time learning to slow down their cast and let the rod do the work. But anyone making the effort to do so will be rewarded by less false casting, less muscle fatigue and improved accuracy, as well as the feeling of being connected with fly fishing history.

There seems to be a general impression among fly fishers that bamboo rods are much too expensive for the average fly fisher. While that may once have been true, it has long been outdated by the widespread growth of bamboo rod making. There can be little doubt that there are vary many more craftsman making high-quality rods today than ever before. Today there are amateur rod makers in all parts of the country routinely turning out rods of quality which

equals or exceeds the rods of the famous makers of the classic era, from the 1920s through the 50s. Many such rods are no more expensive than high end graphite. Some nationally known makers even offer a set of ferruled blanks for as little as 400 dollars, which anyone who has built a graphite rod can easily complete.

In the belief that no serious fly fisher need should be deprived of the pleasure of fishing with bamboo, I have decided to offer my fellow club members the opportunity to make their own bamboo rod in my shop under my direction. This is not a course in rod making, which would take very much more time than I am able to give. The idea is to enable one to accomplish a set of ferruled blanks, a butt section and two tips, as quickly as possible by taking advantage of my labor saving machinery to minimize hand sanding and planing. The cost of materials for this stage is currently \$90. For a complete a rod, with rod sock and aluminum tube, one should plan on spending \$200.

I do not intend to charge for my time or the use of my facilities and equipment. The cost to the individual is only for the bamboo in any components, at my cost. There are currently three people working with rods at various stages of completion and one person on the waiting list. Since the demand may exceed my available time, I did not expect to have three people all the time, I plan to develop an application form for assigning priority on the waiting list. When it is completed it will be available for download from my website: www.skiphosfield.com.



Jim Rainey, former Exec. Director of the FFF, received the first rod produced after I set up my shop in 2008, a 6'6" 3 weight. He recently sent me pictures of himself and Joe Humphreys fishing my rod on the exclusive Spruce Creek Rod & Gun Club water in Pennsylvania.



A Tribute to a Good Friend (Continued)

We made it to the ramp without incident. I pulled in and went to retrieve the pickup while Bill stayed in the boat, still smiling and casting. I backed the trailer off the ramp, slid the boat onto the trailer and pulled boat and Bill up into the parking lot. That was when I realized that Bill would have difficulty getting his legs over the side of the boat and reaching the trailer with his foot so he could find enough stability to swing his other foot over the side. We made two or three attempts and finally I told Bill to stretch out along the gunnel of the boat, and roll over the side so I could catch him and ease him to the ground. It worked. By then we were beat. On the way back to town, Bill had me pull into the Thurston Taco Bell for a taco. I accepted. What I was not aware of is that that trip would be the last fishing trip we would have together. The next month the pictures I had taken of Bill and the others were in the Newsreel which made a nice memorial for Bill. On our way home that night Bill indicated that his health was not improving. I thought it was his knees and legs with which he had been having trouble but as he spoke I could tell that it was something much more serious. I asked him what was really going on and he just kind of shrugged it off.

On Thursday October 24th the day after our annual fundraising auction, I gave Bill a call but there was no answer. I had picked up a joke book at the auction so decided to stop in and give it to him in person. When I arrived at his residence in Springfield, I knocked and was granted access. I told the person on duty who I was and that I was looking for Bill Wise to give him a joke book I had purchased at our auction. He looked at me with a compassionate face and said "I'm sorry to tell you this, but Bill passed on Tuesday October 22nd 2013".

Bill was born in Drain, Oregon and was 83 years of age. He will definitely be missed. The Celebration of Life for Bill will be held on November 15th at the First Christian Church, 1166 Oak Street in down town Eugene at 2:00 PM.
