

**The Prez Sez by Glenn Miller**

I missed April's general meeting but heard that club member Bob Wolfe did an excellent presentation on the subject of fishing chironomids. I haven't fished midges that much in the past but as I learn about how much of a fish's diet is made up of this particular bug, I'm starting to use more midge patterns with increasing success. Having someone with that expertise in our club is going to be great.

On my recent trip to Eastern Oregon I caught my first fish on the Owyhee River on my new fly rod (built in our winter fly rod class) on an emerger tied by Steve Overall. A bit later I caught another nice brown on a chironomid tied by Bob Wolfe. Then I tried a skwala stone tied by Rod Roth but the skwala hatch had come off a couple of weeks earlier on this fishery so maybe next year. It's great to have so many good fly tiers in this club willing to share their patterns.

We have two more volunteer opportunities coming up in the next month. The Thurston Outdoor School (for 6<sup>th</sup> graders) is being held on Tuesday, June 3<sup>rd</sup> and Thursday, June 5<sup>th</sup>. If you can volunteer your time to help with fly tying or fly casting on one of those days please call Dave Prindel at 541-746-8620. The other event is the Spring Fly Fishing Festival being held at the Campbell Senior Center on Saturday, June 21<sup>st</sup>. This is an annual event led by the McKenzie Fly-fishers. Our club has always been involved along with the Damsel Flies, and ODFW. We need someone to host our CFF booth and help is needed with fly casting and fly tying demonstrations. If you can help in one of these areas,

please call Mike Hinkley (from the MFF) (408) 307-1332 who is coordinating this event.

I hear reports of many people fishing on streams, rivers, and lakes. Safety on the water is a topic we need to start discussing in earnest this time of year. At the next general meeting (May 28<sup>th</sup>), I'd like a few of you to share some of the safety lessons and tips that you've learned. We can all learn from each other!

**Second Quarter Club Report to  
Oregon Council for the Federation of Fly  
Fishers

Marv Clemons, CFF Rep. to ORCFFF**

The much anticipated move into the famous historic "Vet's Club" in the center of Eugene at 1626 Willamette Street is now a reality and has more than met club members expectations. One of the high points of the move is that the venue is set up and taken down by Vet's Club personnel allowing CFF members to socialize, get signatures for outings and share fish stories without needing to move chairs and other equipment. Another asset is that the restaurant is open during the meetings so CFF members can catch a bite after work or after the meeting rather going all the way home and returning for the meeting. The many new officers, committee chairs and Board members reported in the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Report have settled into their new responsibilities bringing new ideas and enthusiasm to the club. Current membership remains relatively stable at 88. Coming into the year with a healthy budget after a very successful club auction in October 2013 it was possible for the club to plan and schedule a full calendar of events including, outings, classes, club picnic, holiday party, youth activities, programs, conservation projects, monthly club raffles, and public service activities. Planning for the 2014 auction will begin with a joint Board and Auction Committee meeting on July 16, 2014.

Michael T. Williams, the CFF Program chair has scheduled another exciting list of presenters for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter general meetings. Presenters scheduled include: Chester Allen, Fly Fishing for Sea-Run Cutthroat; Michael T. Williams, Successful Fly Fishing the High Cascade Lakes; and the always popular Cascade Fly Fishers Membership Fishing Success Stories. Additional high quality programs will be added as we move into summer and fall.

Outings for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter will continue the great tradition of the CFF and include some repeats as well as new experiences: April - Hult Reservoir (Horton Pond), May - Hemlock Lake, June - Chewaucan River, June - Erma Bell Lakes, July - High Lakes Gathering, July - Umpqua River Smallmouth, August - East Lake, September - Crooked River, September - Coastal Lakes Fly Fishing.

As always the educational activities were as popular as ever with each being filled to capacity. Fly Tying with Rod Roth, Bamboo Rod Building with Skip Hosfield and Randy Beard, Demonstration tying and casting at the Cabela's Outdoor Days, Fly Tying and Casting lessons for youth at the Discover Oregon Event held at Gateway Mall, Demonstration tying and casting and a fundraising raffle at the Antique Wooden Boat Show at Eagle Rock Lodge, Outdoor School for 200 Thurston Middle School 6<sup>th</sup> grade students with two days of casting, fly tying, stream entomology, conservation, and water quality testing held at a youth camp on the upper Row River above Dorena Lake, and of course all programs offered are considered educational as well.

With the completion of the clubs 2013 commitment to the City of Eugene to provide the person power needed to assist in the effort to eradicate the invasive species found in and around the Delta Pond complex in Eugene and replant with all native plants and trees and shrubs, Glen Neal, Conservation chair has re-negotiated a similar commitment for 2014. These work parties will begin in September. The Delta Pond Project was also assisted through a grant from the Oregon

Council to purchase the native plants, trees, and grasses planted. Thurston Middle School in Springfield, also received a conservation grant from ORCFFF, has successfully completed the second phase of the project funded by their grant. The final reports on the two grants have been submitted, funds awarded and all bills paid.

The CFF has really benefitted from the inclusion of its new members, most of who are female and active in the Damsel Fly Organization and Casting for Recovery, the goal of which is to provide fly tying, casting, river trips and other outdoor activities for female cancer survivors. The CFF, through its group of exceptional fly tiers have contributed hundreds of flies toward the "Fly Box" (it holds hundreds of flies) that will become one of the main fundraisers for Casting for Recovery. Raffle tickets are currently on sale for \$5.00 each. Many of these new members have built their own fly rods, some of which are bamboo, and taken the fly tying course and now enjoy the excitement of catching fish on the flies they have tied themselves.

Without a doubt one of the high points of the year was the involvement of the 32 CFF Volunteers who participated in the ORCFFF Fly Tying and Fishing EXPO in Albany. The CFF was responsible for setting up and operating the Bucket Raffle, Tiers Silent Auction, and assisting with oral and silent auctions held Saturday evening. For the first time there was a special raffle event held on Sunday for youth. The kids who got involved had to work their way through four fly fishing stations: Fly Tying, Fly Casting, knot tying, and Clay Sculpture. As each progressed through the stations additional raffle tickets were awarded that could be used to win prizes at the raffle tables. Thanks to the many vendors such as Amato Publishing, Wasatch Tying Tools, and Cabela's Sporting Goods who contributed books, rods, reels, tying tools and many other items, every youngster who came to the event took home one or more prizes. Not only were the kids happy but the parents thought it was a great event. 65 youth went through the stations, and at least 30 additional came to the tables with their parents and won prizes. Many

parents asked if the Sunday event would be continued next year.

Also of note for the CFF at the EXPO was that two of our members won awards given by the Oregon Council. Vic Hadley was awarded the "Fly Tier of the Year". Vic has had a distinguished tying career both nationally and locally. He's tied at many fly tying shows across the country and is well known for his classic steel-head and spey flies. Vic has contributed many fly boxes and fly plates to the CFF annual auction and gives away flies at his many fly tying events. In addition he has been a solid member of the CFF for many years and has been a Board member for the last several years. Vic was very deserving of this award. Also, Marv Clemons was presented the "Federator of the Year Award" also given by the Oregon Council. This award is given annually to an Oregon Council member who has contributed substantially and significantly to the Council's mission through efforts that include involvement with education, conservation, leadership activities, NW Expo, membership recruitment, and youth activities. Marv has been very active in all of these areas for many years and is a plank owner in the CFF.

Please enjoy this 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarterly Report and we look forward to bringing our additional plans for 2014 into reality.

## Middle Erma Bell Lake Outing Trip Host Glenn Miller June 20-21



**Date:** Friday-Saturday (June 20-21). You can come for both days or just one of the days. I'll have a sign-up sheet at the May 28 meeting. Car pooling is an option.

**Location:** This area is accessible from either the McKenzie or Willamette Highway. I'll describe the southern route. Take Hwy 58 east and turn left at the Westfir exit (at the Middle Fork Ranger Station) a couple of miles before Oakridge. Go a short distance and turn left again just past the bridge. Continue straight past Westfir's covered bridge onto Road 19. Follow this paved route for 31 miles to a pass just before the Box Canyon Guard Station. Turn right onto Road 1957 and drive about 3.6 to its end at Skookum Campground (4,500 foot elevation). For those spending the night, there is a campground with tent sites available. The camping fee is nominal. If just staying for the day, a Northwest Trail Pass is required. The Middle Erma Bell lake is about a 50 minute, gentle hike from the trailhead located at the campground and is in the Three Sisters Wilderness. An option that some have chose in the past is to camp at one of the south shore campsites at Middle Erma Bell Lake.

**Option 1:** For those that will be leaving on Friday, we'll meet for breakfast Friday at 8:00 am at the Sunrise Café in Pleasant Hill. After breakfast (around 9 am) we'll head for the lake. We'll drive to the campsite, secure our campsites (for those planning to camp), and prepare to hike in.

**Options 2:** For those that will be coming up later in the day on Friday (or just on Saturday), please let me know your plans in advance so I will know who is coming.

**Lake and Fish Information:** This is a 40 acre lake with native Rainbow trout (up to 22 inches). The average size tends to be around 12-14 inches. The Lakes are self sustaining and very productive. You can keep two fish and we usually keep a few and fry them up for dinner. The Lower and Upper Erma Bell Lakes are not that far away and can also be good fishing.

**Fishing Gear:** While not an absolute necessity, a float tube (or other floating device) is very handy to get out in the lake and allow room for back casting since the shoreline is pretty brushy most of the way around the lake. I'd suggest a PFD as well for safety. Four to six weight rods work well with both floating and sinking lines. Most years we've fished both floating and intermediate lines and did well. I've found that a slow sink (intermediate) line works best but having a floating line is handy in case there is surface activity. Bring the usual assortment of flies for a Cascades high lake with dries (adams, comparaduns, callebatis, etc....size 12-16), nymphs (pheasant tail, prince, hares ears, etc.) and streamers (woolly buggers, leaches, etc.). Some years (last year in particular) I've seen prolific callibaetis hatches in June; it just depends on the conditions at the time.

**What to Bring:** If you're going to camp, bring the normal camping gear and food. While the weather is usually pretty nice in late June, bring some cold weather clothing just in case of inclement weather. Also bring mosquito repellent. We will probably do a group meal Friday night. I'll contact those going in advance to make these plans. Also, I will cook breakfast (eggs, bacon, etc.) for everyone on Saturday morning.

## Chewaucan River Outing June 4th through 7th or 8th

For those of us that love small stream fly-fishing the Chewaucan River in southeastern Oregon is a rare gem. Early in the season when our Willamette Valley streams are running high and swift, with walk-in access to safe, wadeable-water scarce; the Chewaucan offers up mile after mile of gentle riffles and runs, chutes and pools as it winds through public lands southwest of Paisley.

True, you're unlikely to catch that trophy red-band suitable for mounting on the wall of your den. Still, the fish are usually plentiful, eager and seldom selective.

Drought in the late 90's took quite a toll on this fishery and though I've not visited as often in the years since precipitation has returned to more normal levels, in my mind the fishing has rebounded nicely. Management changes may be partially responsible, as the river above the Hwy 31 bridge in Paisley is no longer stocked and is closed to bait fishing. In short it's now managed for wild fish.

Paisley is about a five hour drive from the valley and though there are some lodging options in that area, I plan to camp at the Forest Service campground at Marster Springs. From Paisley it's a seven mile drive on the paved road (FS33) to reach this lovely little campground on the banks of the Chewaucan River. The standard equipment includes vault toilets and there is a well with an 'old-fashioned' hand pump, to

limber up your casting arm. Each campsite comes with a fire ring, a picnic table, and (if you visit in early June), it's own swarm of Mosquitoes.

The remoteness of this stream played a big role in selecting dates for this outing. It's too long a drive to risk finding your favorite campsite occupied and the river down to a mere trickle.

So, come join me and find out why a fishing trip to the Chewaucan often turns out to be the most memorable trip of the year.




